Case Study #1

- A continuous set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.
- Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Shane and Eric attended the WASTEWATER LABORATORY METHODS workshop in Boise on August 24th. This training was sponsored by the Idaho Rural Water Association with renown Wastewater Microbiologist, Toni Glymph-Martin from Illinois. The class focused on understanding the role bacteria, protozoa, and metazoan in the treatment process, and how to anticipate upsets in the system and troubleshoot existing problems. The guys received hands-on practice with conducting laboratory analysis for our own plant.

AMBULANCE SUBSCRIPTION MEMBERSHIPS AVAILABLE

The City of Riggins Ambulance Subscription Membership applications are now available with an effective date of October 1, 2021 (renewal is required each year).

An ambulance transport can cost between \$800 and \$1,300. This program works like a supplement to your existing insurance or Medicare/Medicaid, or fills the financial gap if you don't already have insurance.

Individual membership \$ 100 Lifetime Membership \$1,000

Family Membership \$ 100

(Any unmarried dependent children under the age of 25, or other students that have court documented guardianship papers)

All emergency calls resulting in a transport by Riggins Ambulance are covered under this program. Membership applications are available at City Hall or can be accessed online at www.rigginsidaho.org






Our Riggins Ambulance recently installed the ZOLL X Series Advanced Monitor to improve care during cardiac emergencies.

The ZOLL has the capabilities of obtaining an EKG of our patient's heart. We are able to send that to the hospital before we even leave Riggins. This technology is vital in the event we have an individual in our community who experiences a heart attack. Because we can send confirmation to the hospital before we leave town, they are already calling bigger hospitals to arrange transport and advanced cardiac care. The ZOLL also obtains blood pressures, oxygen saturation, end-title CO2, and aids in

confirmation of advanced airway placement."

DARE TO KAYAK

had another amazing year... 23 students for six days learning about not only kayaking, but water safety, stewardship and our rivers, and how to live an active life that does not include drugs and alcohol abuse. There were 8 native students from the Rios to Rivers Native Kayak Club who joined the group one day. A number of guest speakers presented on a variety of topics including fish habitat and healthy rivers, paddle safety and etiquette, and wilderness First Aid.
